



Language Reactor


Free Chrome extension where you can have dual subtitles on Netflix and YouTube



Native language and a target language or maybe two target languages at the same time




Catalog of YouTube videos and sort by vocabulary level




You can also make flashcards with those words and import them into Anki.


There is this project that already exists that is using human voices in different languages to train Al, and Clozemaster took these sentences and made a listening game



Improve your listening skills and finally learn to understand native speakers in another language.

Understanding native speakers is tough! They speak way too fast, the words run together, and they drop sounds and even entire words sometimes.






We took the datasets from Common Voice, did some basic filtering to get a set of quality sentences, normalized the audio, added machine translations, and added Al grammar explanations. We end up with a max of 10,000 sentences for each language that can be played through at random.



YouGlish

Takes you directly to sentences in YouTube videos that contain the word/phrase you want to hear pronounced in context




Master English pronunciation naturally! Learn how to pronounce tricky sounds like a native with YouGlish's real-world clips. No more dictionary confusion, just real English in context.

Examples: power, courage, coup de grâce, how's it going? (Advanced search)






Free collection of example sentences with translations geared towards foreign language learners. It is available in more than 400 languages





Forvo


Look up any word or phrase in your target language to hear how native speakers pronounce it

News texts in simple language in about 30 languages


After each article, it has a list of comprehension questions that you can answer

Highlight a word and it instantly pulls up the translation



This one isn't technically free by itself, but it does come "free" now







Each time you visit a website, Toucan translates certain words and phrases into the language you're trying to learn






Virgin Queen and Good Queen Bess. Her reign was a great era in the history of England. At her death, she named James IV of Scotland as her successor to the English throne.



A mod shares a link to a very detailed quiz to find out what language to start learning:


